RRC Projects

RRC's Education Committee, chaired by Nathan Whitt, held a "Springs Awareness for Educators" forum August 14th at the Rainbow Springs State Park. Education resources and demonstrations were provided by RRC, SWFWMD, the Florida Springs Institute (FSI), and the Aquatic Preserve Manager. Speakers from SWFWMD and the FSI gave talks about the hydrogeology and ecology of the springs. About 50 Marion County teachers and administrators attended. Volunteers from Friends of Rainbow Springs helped make this event a great success. RRC's Education Committee is working on offering a similar event next year and on supporting visits of student groups to sample and test the spring water.

River Recreation

As discussed previously excessive recreation on the Rainbow River has been a problem. Too many tubers and some misbehavior have detracted from a peaceful experience on the river. This past summer the Fish & Wildlife Commission, the Sheriff's Office, and the Dunnellon Police Department teamed up to put more officers on the river and this had a calming effect. We are thankful for that effort and we hope that this practice will continue. We also hope that our Recreational Guidelines brochure helped.



River Pollution

We have also discussed in previous newsletters the extraordinary nitrate levels in the river leading to excessive algae growth and displacement of natural vegetation. FDEP's Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP), which will be discussed at our annual meeting, identifies the sources of the nitrates in the 700 square mile aquifer recharge basin that feeds flow to the Rainbow River. The nitrate sources are primarily urban and agricultural fertilizers, septic tanks, and animal waste. FDEP's study suggests that the Rainbow Springs nitrate level of 2.2 mg/l must be reduced by 82%.

The BMAP goal stated above will require an enormous effort in all sectors and a great deal of money. Senator Dean sponsored a bill last year aimed at attacking this problem with various projects but the House of Representatives failed to provide a companion bill. He will discuss at our annual meeting his renewed effort to get a springs protection bill through the legislature next year. As always, money is a stumbling block. However, Amendment 1 on the ballot in November could alleviate that concern. Amendment 1 would dedicate 1/3 of the existing document stamp tax to renewing the funding for Florida Forever and springs protection projects. We must support Amendment 1 in November.

RRC lost a good friend and colleague when Barbara Weston passed away last month. Barbara was a long time member of RRC and served on the Board of Directors and as recording secretary for many years. She had a great love for the Rainbow River and she was always willing to serve in any capacity for RRC. She will be greatly missed.

Rainbow River Ranch Litigation

In our last newsletter we reported that the court had granted leave to the developer, the City of Dunnellon, and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) to amend their petition for approval of the city/developer lawsuit settlement agreement. As expected, the petitioners amended their petition to include DEO comments as to why the settlement agreement is in the public interest. RRC intervenors disagree with DEO's conclusions and feel that we are still entitled to an evidentiary hearing. Therefore, the intervenors recently filed a response and a request for an evidentiary hearing. Obviously, this legal effort to protect the Rainbow River and its environment is an expensive ordeal.
