

RRC continues to advocate for protection of the Rainbow River and its environment.

Rainbow River Ranch Litigation

On July 3rd a case management conference was held in judge's chambers to discuss the direction of the Bert Harris lawsuit brought by the RRR developer against the City of Dunnellon. The City capitulated to the developer in 2010 in a settlement agreement that promised land use and facilities that would be very expensive to the City and threaten the Rainbow River. Thus, the Department of Community Affairs (DCA), RRC, and 15 individuals legally intervened in the settlement agreement. In the interim Governor Scott eliminated the DCA and replaced it with the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO). Last year the DEO joined the developer and the City in a renewed settlement agreement which effectively is the same as the 2010 version. The developer's attorney moved for a non-evidentiary hearing in hopes of getting the court to accept the settlement agreement while our attorney has responded with a request for an evidentiary hearing with witness testimony. A date will be set for the non-evidentiary hearing and we hope that the result is an order for an evidentiary hearing where our objections to the settlement agreement can be fully heard by the court. River Recreation

The Recreation Guidelines Project headed up by Kathryn Taubert has garnered input from a large number of stakeholders including representatives from city, county and state agencies as well as 11 stakeholder groups involved in river recreation. The final draft is now being reviewed by FWC, Florida Parks and Recreation, and SWFWMD. The Guidelines will be distributed in a variety of formats to river recreational users, commercial operators and property owners to help individuals learn what specifically they can do to protect the river.

One of the problems on the river is the enormous number of tubers on the summer weekends. Motorboats, in an effort to avoid the tubers, often move into shallow areas and tear up the natural vegetation which provides habitation for the aquatic life. This is particularly bad when tubers tie themselves together in large groups while floating down the river. The City of Dunnellon, within its area of jurisdiction, has an ordinance which disallows this grouping of tubers while the County does not have such a restriction. Some resolution between the two jurisdictions needs to be found with regard to river ordinances.
